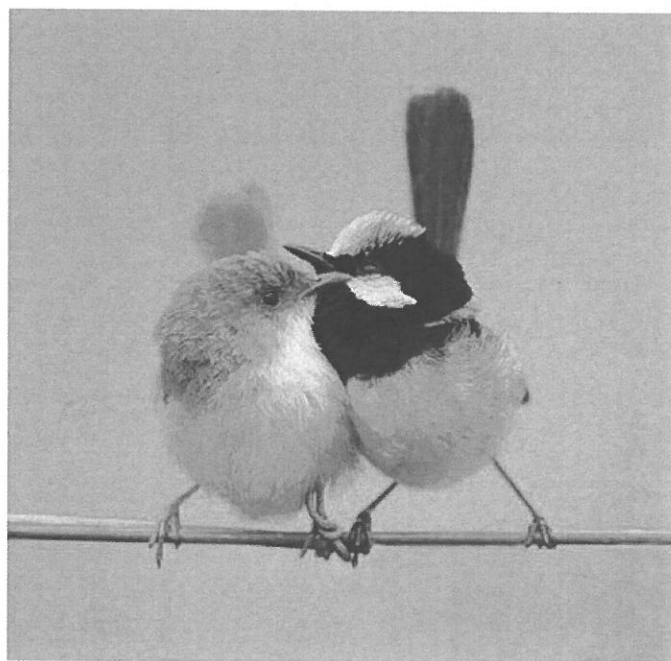

The Port Phillip EcoCentre Inc., a not-for-profit umbrella environment organisation, is a resource for groups, individuals and the business community in the City of Port Phillip and its wider region. The EcoCentre is located in the St Kilda Botanical Gardens on the corner of Blessington and Herbert Streets in St. Kilda.

President's Report

Presidents Report

Last year we spoke of the amended constitution enabling us to make better and more informed decisions and I am pleased to inform you that the committee for the past year has achieved that aim and functioned at the highest possible level. Our management of the organisation has seen us operate within our financial capacity, again achieving an operating surplus.

The Integrated Environmental Partnerships program continues to function at a level of excellence that has seen the completion of projects to the benefit of the schools such as Christian Brothers Schools whose project to harvest water to flush toilets and wash hands. The saving in water from this project alone is estimated at 500,000 litres per annum. Practical projects improving the sustainability profile of our community is one of the major reasons for the existence of EcoCentre.

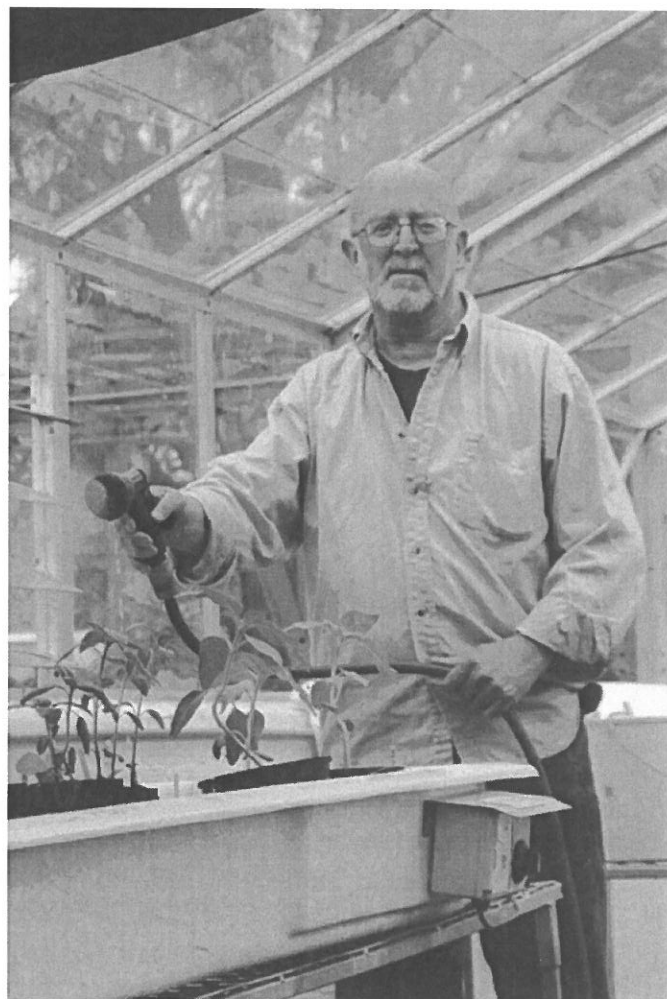
Any dynamic organisation like EcoCentre needs to examine its structures and performance to ensure that it functions to the benefit of the community. To that end we have commenced a process to re-examine our strategic plan and have engaged the services of Pat Armstrong, a leading environmental educator and organisational strategist, to help us in our task.

One of our great strengths is the commitment of our members, staff and partners to our purposes; the year is full of stories of people hard at it late at night or working through the rain to complete a task.

The expertise of EcoCentre's members and staff allows us to give guidance and advice that helps our partners to better understand and appreciate the nature of their projects.

The Wilderness Society, one of the leading advocacy groups in the country, recently affiliated with EcoCentre reinforcing our commitment to strong argument on behalf of the environment.

Financial support for us has come from a variety of sources but special mention must be made of



the support of the City of Port Phillip, our primary sponsor without whom we would be unable to continue.

July saw the publication by the Department Sustainability and Environment of the 'Sustainability Action Statement 2006'. That document calls for the setting up of six eco-living houses "based on the successful Port Phillip Ecohouse".

We are encouraged that the Department is taking note of our endeavours and we look forward to further co-operation.

Treasurer's Report July 1, 2005 – June 30, 2006

Income for the financial year increased by \$71,774 with expenses increasing by \$75,827. The operating surplus of \$17,994 is largely off-set by the \$15,945 of liabilities detailed on the balance sheet.

During the year major sponsorship was received from the City of Port Phillip (\$170,515), G.M. Holden Ltd (\$25,000), Kangan Batman TAFE 'work-for-the dole' (\$17,895), and the Victorian Department of Sustainability and Environment (\$13,632).

The EcoCentre generated income of \$17,561 from membership fees, book sales, venue hire etc, in addition to receiving \$6,859 in donations.

Introduction of the highly successful Integrated Environment Partnerships (schools program) substantially increased wages and associated expenses from \$86,333 in 2005 to \$192,140 in 2006. For the forthcoming year a budget has been established to ensure a satisfactory cash flow is maintained.

Audit Scope

I disclaim any assumption of responsibility for any reliance on this report or on the financial report to which it relates to any person other than the members, or for any purpose other than that for which it was prepared.

My audit has been conducted in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. My procedures included examination, on a test basis, of evidence supporting the amounts and other disclosures in the financial report and the evaluation of significant accounting estimates. These procedures have been undertaken to form an opinion whether, in all material respect, the financial report is presented fairly in accordance with the accounting policies described in Note 1 so as to present a view which is consistent with my understanding of the Association's financial position, and performance as represented by the results of its operations. These policies do not require the application of all Accounting Standards and other mandatory professional reporting requirements in Australia.

The audit opinion expressed in this report has been formed on the above basis.

Audit Opinion

In my opinion, the financial report of Port Phillip EcoCentre Inc. presents a true and fair view of the financial position of Port Phillip EcoCentre Inc. as at 30 June 2006 and the results of its operations for the year then ended in accordance with the accounting policies described in Note 1 to the financial statements.

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act (Vic.). The committee has determined that the EcoCentre is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act (Vic.) and the following Australian Accounting Standards:

- AASB 112 Income Taxes
- AASB 1031 Materiality
- AASB 110 Events after the Balance Sheet Date
- AASB 117 Leases

No other applicable Accounting Standards, Urgent Issues Group Consensus Views or other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board have been applied.

The financial report has been based on historic costs and does not take into account changing money values, or except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following material accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

- (a) Fixed Assets
Fixed assets are not being depreciated.
- (b) Income Tax
Pursuant to the provisions of the Income Tax Assessment Act the Port Phillip EcoCentre Inc. is exempt from income tax.

We have been fortunate to secure substantial sponsorships from Holden and DSE which provides for the IEP to continue to the end of 2006. The team is already delivering wonderful results in the following schools:

- St. Kilda Primary School
- St. Kilda Park Primary School
- Middle Park Primary School
- Elwood Primary School
- St. Columbas Primary School
- Elwood College
- Stonnington Primary School
- Christian Brothers College (CBC), St. Kilda

In December these schools will come together at the EcoCentre to celebrate a Harvest Festival to show off their achievements, display their produce and take part in various fun activities.

In order to deliver the IEP and assist schools to maintain their sustainability achievements many new resources and programs have been developed, as well as planning documents to be consistent with the federal and state governments education for sustainability frameworks.

Projects undertaken include: sustainable food gardens, Indigenous habitat gardens, Water audits, Water harvesting systems, rainwater tank installations, and applications for federal water grants.

Partnerships with LandLearn (the education branch of the Department of Primary Industry) and South East Water have been established for the future development of joint workshops and seminars. Liaison and planning with Port Phillip Council Officers has established an important communication network with our primary sponsor.

Growing Indigenous Links

The EcoCentre acknowledges the traditional owners of the land and seeks to address the marginalised status of Aboriginal people by providing practical support. We are very proud to have 'Our Rainbow Place' as an affiliate member group. This relationship presents opportunities to address the issues associated with dispossession suffered by the first Australians and provides a setting for friendships and understanding.

Over the course of the 2005-06 year the EcoCentre's links with the indigenous community has taken many forms:

Reserving a position on the EcoCentre committee of management for Indigenous representation.

Providing a venue for gatherings and rehearsal space for the Sorry Day 'Funny Bones' theatre performance.

Contributing to planning and delivery of educational projects which raise awareness of Indigenous cultural heritage, such as the Port Phillip Libraries for the Earth: Ngar-gee Tree schools activities.

Critiquing archaeological survey reports for the Victorian Boonerwung Elders Land Aboriginal Council (VBELAC); and developing organisational processes to enable VBE-LAC to respond to the demands of land development proposals.

Production and distribution of publications on behalf of Earthcare, including 'Growing Local Knowledge' (a DVD documentary on local ethnobotanist, Dr Beth Gott); and the reprint of the 'Indigenous Plants of the Sandbelt' book.

Advocacy in relation to Indigenous Cultural Heritage including submission to Parks Victoria for retention and protection of regionally rare Yellow-box trees in Albert Park Reserve. This advocacy has extended to coordinating the preparation of the 'St Kilda Indigenous Heritage Trail' proposal in conjunction with Park Community Association and Earthcare.

The 'St Kilda Indigenous Heritage Trail' is expected to provide a practical opportunity for wider community involvement in creating the trail; and will be an ongoing educational resource which promotes awareness and appreciation of Indigenous Culture.

New Environmental Directions (NED)

Once again, this year the NED crew of Central Bayside Community Health Service have been gracing the EcoCentre every Monday. The mix of clients has changed slightly to give others a chance to experience the sense of accomplishment and community involvement that this program provides. Participants are Tabetha Clark, Robert Barkley, Stuart Bacon, James "Slackin' Off" Caplygin, Steven Duggan, Terry Hall, and occasionally Jacquie Cowan.

NED activities rotate from week to week. The group have fostered a strong link with Westgate Park, where, guided by George, Tony and Naomi, they have seen the development of their

wetland area, and put lots of elbow grease (and cartings of wheelbarrows by Robert!) into mulching and planting other areas of the park. They have also gained much from interaction with both corporate working groups and other volunteer groups such as Conservation Volunteers Australia. This community involvement is so beneficial to clients, as well as improving the wider community's understanding of people with disabilities.

A new activity that the clients really love is the monthly visit to Collingwood Children's Farm. With farm staff member Julia, the clients provide valuable maintenance work, feeding animals, milking the cow, weeding, maintaining animal enclosures, and other such farm work. There are other groups of people with disabilities that attend the Farm on Mondays, and the clients enjoy eating their lunch together, in front of the fire in winter, and out under the shade of trees in the summer.

In between times, the cooking program continues at home base in the EcoCentre kitchen, filling the house with aroma and some occasional raucousness, and other random activities include monitoring the Tawny Frogmouths in St Kilda Botanic Gardens, researching eco-based topics in the local library, and keeping a scrapbook of exciting adventures and discoveries in the EcoCentre program.

A recent one-off project was the construction of a garden display, showing the concept of crop rotation, which is to be a feature and drawcard of the EcoCentre garden, visible as visitors walk into the Centre grounds. Clients are extremely proud and excited to be creating this interface for community understanding!

St Kilda Indigenous Nursery Cooperative

It was a long time coming but we finally have our new website which allows us to reach a wider audience to spread the indigenous plants gospel. Go to www.skinc.com.au and let us know what you think.



After a few hiccups we have our second Work for Dole crew who are dutifully learning to prick out, take cuttings and weed out the dreaded flickweed. We also had a Green Corps team visit us every Wednesday for a while to learn more about indigenous plants. With so many hands helping in the nursery, it has freed us up to go out to some of the Natural Heritage Areas around Port Phillip, and play with plants every so often. We mainly visit Hester Reserve along the Port Melbourne light rail line and the native section of the St Kilda Botanic Gardens, and do handweeding, pruning and a bit of planting. Take a look, perhaps you will be able to tell where we've been.

Every year we supply plants to the Council to maintain and upgrade their existing sites. Plants grown this year have also gone to various new projects around Port Phillip including along the new bike path at Sandridge Beach and a street planting in Victoria Avenue.

Sustainable Community Progress Indicators (SCPI)

Pronounced Skippy, like the well-loved kangaroo, the SCPI project aims to answer this question: are things in Port Phillip getting better or worse? SCPI is a Port Phillip council/community partnership that relies on community participation for data collection and uses traditional and innovative ways to "measure the stuff that really matters".

SCPI collects data on diverse topics, such as the crime rate in Port Phillip, the way in which kids go to school, how much it costs to buy lunch in our shops, the number of breeding penguins on the St Kilda breakwater, water usage per household and the number of people who smile or say "hi" when you walk down the street.

Joel Meadows (SCPI Project Coordinator) has been based in the EcoCentre's community resource room, one day a week for the last year and a half. This has given the project a great connection to the EcoCentre community, and to the wider community. The EcoCentre is proud to be part of this innovative program and to provide practical support to CoPP initiatives.

Affiliate Reports

Jewish Ecological Coalition Inc (JECO)

JECO, The Jewish Ecological Coalition, a not-for-profit organisation, was founded in Melbourne in July 2003 by several like minded Jewish Organisations to emphasize and deepen Jewish commitment to ecological sustainability.



Our objectives, which relate to the individual, society and the wider world, are:

- To educate and encourage individuals & the community to "tread softly on the face of the earth"; i.e. to minimize their environmental footprint
- To modify local community and government decision-making towards greater environmental concern and sustainability.
- To build bridges of mutual appreciation and cooperation within the Jewish community and between the Jewish and wider communities by working together for ecological sustainability.
- To work with individuals and organisations to prevent and repair environmental damage & to work towards leaving the environment in a better state for future generations.

In our short existence we organised two very successful Eco-festivals with the aim of showing the Jewish and wider communities what is being done and what can be done to halt and reverse environmental damage. The festivals featured practical demonstrations, including solar energy and hybrid electric/petrol cars, sustainable technology, talks by specialists covering a wide range of environmental issues, a panel of politicians debating challenges to Victoria's environment, schools debate, youth eco-competition, environmental stalls and displays and a children's program.

We set up a mobile phone recycling project in co-operation with a recycling company and with the participation of a number of Jewish schools and other organisations. We have collected hundreds of phones which would otherwise have ended up in rubbish tips.

Earlier this year we organised an Ecosymposium "**How to Power our Future**" topics covered included; *Low energy transportation, Building a low energy home & a debate "Nuclear power, yes or no?"*.

We had good attendances at two 'Home Demo Assessments' where householders were given tips on improving the 'sustainability' of their house, hence saving energy and money.

Friends of Westgate Park

Friends of Westgate Park had a busy year with many exciting projects undertaken. The monthly average number of volunteer hours worked in the park exceeded 500 hours. Based on Parks Victoria's last published volunteer hours, this represents a contribution of about 4% of the whole state total. During the year we planted over 10,000 plants including trees, shrubs, understorey plants and grasses. Over 150 truckloads of mulch were spread and existing beds weeded.



During the year we completed the new red gum woodland - the area to the north along the Herald Sun boundary fence. It took just over 14 months to add this valuable asset to the park by transforming a flat wasteland into a series of hills and lagoons planted with red gum forest species. The sounds of frogs in the lagoons at times even drown out the traffic noise from the Westgate Bridge. The final financial cost incurred by the Friends for the ground works was \$67,345.79. This was provided by Landcare Australia from sponsors, Holden and Kraft.

The Friends Group has put a great deal of effort during the last year to reach out into the community seeking to build relationships far beyond the boundaries of Westgate Park. This has involved a large number of planting days using volunteers from other organizations including not-for profit groups, business corporations, educational institutions and local government.

We continue sponsoring a Work for Dole scheme in the park. The numbers participating has varied during the year with a peak number of six. They have contributed so much with some really keen and competent volunteers. It is this group that really provides the week-by-week work force for park improvements.



The Friends will continue to advocate strongly for the improvement of the park for habitat and for the enjoyment of passive recreation. These are two complimentary goals and should at all times take priority over other use that conflict with them.

Meet you down at the veggie patch...

One of CoPP's most dynamic community groups and exemplifying the spirit of St Kilda, Veg Out is an organic, chemical-free garden run entirely by volunteers.

We have over 150 garden plots, where local residents and community groups, who might otherwise not have access to a garden, can enjoy growing their own fresh vegetables, flowers and plants.

At Veg Out, we believe in giving back to the community. Veg Out runs a number of community events, such as our Open Day, Easter Egg Hunt and Carrots by Candlelight. The gardens are also used by community groups, such as the Rainbow weekly Monday Barbecue for the local parkies, Mothers' groups and more.

Veg Out also runs the Veg Out St Kilda Farmers' Market, held on the 1st Saturday of each month. At Farmers' Markets, low-impact or organic traders travel from across Victoria sell their produce. The St Kilda Farmers' Market has become extremely popular, and as well as providing the community with access to farm fresh produce it also functions as a community social hub.

As gardeners, we're also very conscious of the importance of water conservation. With the assistance of South East Water, we have two water tanks, which collect and store rainwater for use within the gardens, and which provide examples of water conservation in action. Recent irrigation construction means that we will be able to keep our lawn green throughout summer without using the mains water supply.

We're always looking for more people to get involved. On the first Sunday of each month (except January) we hold Working Bees, which is a very good time to come down, meet people, get your hands in the soil and enjoy a barbecue lunch with everyone.

Wendy enquired about volunteering at the EcoCentre late 2005. A range of activities were offered. Although she'd had minimal gardening experience she was very keen to learn and quickly became involved with the veggie garden, it would be fair to say she's now our head veggie gardener.



She's played a valuable role within the integrated education program (IEP); showing school children around the garden, explaining how worm farms, composting systems and the crop rotation scheme work and also participating in offsite programs at the schools.

So we are delighted to be able to offer her a part time position supervising a group of disabled people, in a new program similar to the NED program.

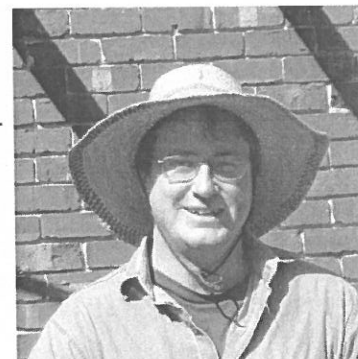
Kerry Coombs
